Catch Up Funding at OBHS:

The literacy and numeracy Catch-up Premium is a government allocation which gives schools additional funding to support pupils in Year 7 who did not achieve the expected standard in reading or maths at the end of Key Stage 2 (KS2). OBHS expects to receive £11635 in 2020 (based on the allocation for 2018-19).

Those learners identified as not achieving the expected standard in reading or Maths at the end of KS2 will receive targeted support to facilitate rapid progress. Our aim is that all learners are equipped with the Core skills in order to be able to access the curriculum equitably with their peers.

Objectives of the Catch-up Funding at OBHS:

- To close the gap in attainment of pupils eligible for 'catch-up' premium by providing a tailored curriculum which targets identified gaps in knowledge and skills;
- To accelerate progress through appropriate intervention;
- To increase the self-efficacy, self-direction and resilience of our pupils who are entitled to 'catch-up' premium.
